# Good news!

## Two services triumph in national awards



A service developed to transform the way patients with respiratory illnesses are treated has won a prestigious healthcare award.

Nurses, doctors and support staff at ULHT won the Frontline Innovations category at the East Midlands Innovation in Healthcare Awards, for their work developing a service to assess the needs of patients with COPD more quickly, ensuring they are able to leave hospital sooner.

In addition, Grantham's ground-breaking "hospice in the hospital" has been announced as the winner of the End of Life Care Development award at the Building Better Healthcare Awards 2015

The hospice, a joint venture between ULHT and St Barnabas Hospice, was recognised for its innovative unique approach of providing care to patients under the responsibility of GPs but with access to hospital nurses, doctors and therapists.

## £1m boost for x-ray in county hospitals

Lincolnshire patients will benefit from faster and more effective treatment following a £950,000 investment in new x-ray equipment.

ULHT has upgraded its x-ray departments at Lincoln County Hospital and John Coupland Hospital, Gainsborough so that both units now provide fully digital x-ray images and radiography.

This will improve the experience of patients, help doctors to provide much faster diagnoses and health professionals to access the information at the touch of a button.

Direct digital radiography is faster than the alternative film, with images produced in seconds. The quality of the images are better which increases the accuracy of diagnoses and reduces the amount of radiation received by a patient.

## Make the right choice this winter

The NHS in Lincolnshire is asking people to think twice before visiting A&E.

During autumn and winter, NHS services are very busy particularly hospital and community services. Lincolnshire people can help by using the alternative urgent care services available in the county.

Dr Suneil Kapadia, medical director for ULHT said "I urge everyone to think twice before they go to A&E. If it's not serious or life threatening, you shouldn't be there."

"Many illnesses can be better treated by visiting your local pharmacy, calling 111, visiting your local GP or GP out of hours services, or attending a walk in centre or a minor injuries unit."
