New roles to aid orthopaedic operations

Two new trainee orthopaedic acute care practitioners have recently started work at a Lincolnshire hospital - in a bid to bridge the national shortfall of junior doctors in the NHS.

Emma Beck and Manu Mathew have now taken up their posts at Pilgrim Hospital in Boston and are both looking forward to the new challenge.

The aim of their new role is to help with the shortage of junior doctors in the area by bridging the gap between nursing and medicine, while at the same time upskilling staff to support the hospital. The Trust currently has 139 doctor vacancies across all of its hospitals.



Emma, who has worked for ULHT for a number of years and is a nurse by trade, said: "It's a very different role to what I have done before and it's really exciting."

1,000 lives saved at Lincolnshire Heart Centre



People who suffer a heart attack or cardiac arrest in Lincolnshire have a greater chance of survival than most areas of the country, thanks to the innovative work of the Lincolnshire Heart Centre. Since it opened in 2013 a thousand lives have been saved by patients being treated at the specialist centre, based at Lincoln County Hospital, rather than other hospital sites in the county.

After spending five weeks in hospital, taxi driver Anthony McMahon knows better than most about the amazing work being carried out by the centre. The father-of-three's heart stopped beating while working out at his local gym. After being ventilated, airlifted to Lincolnshire Heart Centre, spending time in intensive care and undergoing angioplasty surgery the 60-year-old says he is lucky to be alive.

He said: "I was as close to death as you can be. It's a miracle that I am still here and that is all thanks to the doctors, nurses and staff here."

The latest statistics released by the National Institute for Cardiovascular Outcomes Research (NICOR) show that the Lincolnshire Heart Centre is outperforming all of the national targets for treating heart attack patients.

Trust performance – May 2017

- We have a target that 95% of patients visiting A&E should be seen and either treated, admitted or discharged within four hours. For the month of May our performance was 76.49%.
- We have a target to have seen 92% of patients within 18 weeks of a GP referral, and during May 2017 our performance was 89.32%.

- We achieved four out of the nine cancer targets set for us.
- Our latest hospital standardised mortality (HSMR) performance, for June 2015 to May 2016, is 101.76. This is within expected levels.

The next public Trust Board meeting will be held on Tuesday 1 August at The Reservation in Sleaford.
